#### Here are the highlights:

**The Fall Kick Off** with Karen Kirkwood, from AAUW - St. Paul branch and former national

## **Equal Rights Amendment 2023**

If you feel like you have been hearing about the Equal Rights Amendment for your entire life you are right!

2023 is the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of ERA's introduction into Congress. Minnesota was one of eight states to ratify the ERA in 1973. By 1977 a total of 35 states had ratified the amendment, three states short of the required 38. Although the official deadline for ratification has passed, Virginia was the 38<sup>th</sup> state to ratify it in January 2020.To complicate matters, some states have rescinded their ratification. For more on the complicated history see: brennancenter.org and search 'Equal Rights Amendment Explained'.

Kelsey Waits, Minnesota State AAUW VP for Public Policy and Jan Carey urge AAUW members to support adding the ERA to our state constitution. AAUW is also urging members to advocate for Congress to include ERA in the federal constitution.

Our September meeting featured speaker, Karen Kirkwood, on the board of State and National AAUW. The MN board has identified the 4 Public Policy Priorities as Education, Economic Security, Leadership/Governance/ Sustainability and Philanthropy. Following Karen's talk, members responded to those priorities with programming ideas. These and all other suggestions will help the summer team planning our programs for '23-'24.

Here are a few of your responses in each category:

#### **Education of Women and Girls**:

- Explore limits to post HS learning for women of all ages
- Invite teachers and other educators to discuss curriculum/banned books
- Learn from people of color and LBGTQ individuals about bias and limitations
- ♦ Encourage STEM classes and new learning

#### **Economic Security for all Women**

 Educate women/girls about what's needed for secure financial future

- Understand pay scales for jobs/non-traditional roles in RW to increase awareness
- Explore how retired women, professional and other, are faring in this economy
- Invite financial advisors to inform about maximizing our financial futures

#### Leadership/Governance

- Invite women on RW city council/commissions to share their path to leadership
- Learn from women in non-profit leadership roles how to increase the skills of future leaders - Ask branch members to share their journey to leadership and learn from each other
- Find ways to support working women ie creative daycare options

#### Philanthropy

- Create scholarship fund for girls of color to pursue advanced training
- Mentor young women, set up mock job interviews, support local nonprofits
- Fund classes like woodworking and coding, host
  Brave New Girls again
- Provide the High School food shelf with feminine hygiene products
